


After last week's newsletter item and the 'Getting Families Started' PDF that I emailed to parents last week, we hope that remote learning is becoming easier to organise and facilitate for your child. We acknowledge that everyone's situation at home is completely different and therefore trying to keep up to date isn't always easy. With that in mind, we'd like to share some hints and tips with you which may come in handy over the coming weeks.



Did you know that you can download the Seesaw app and log on as a parent? This is a really good way of accessing your child's learning and interact with what they are producing. You can even give likes and comments, much like social media platforms. You should have received an invitation via email from school already but it's not too late to request this in order to sign up. Simply email your class teacher and they will happily connect you with your child's journal. Once you've done this, the icons below may be helpful.

When a child logs on, they should see their journal on the left hand side. This is a portfolio of their hard work. On the right hand side of the screen, they should see three drop down tabs: 'To Do' (which shows all the tasks children need to complete); Draft (Where work has been sent back to the child in order to edit/improve or where a child can access work they've not finished yet – see more below!) and 'Archived' (this is where tasks go once the teacher believes it has been completed by the majority of the class – please note that their own work can still be found in their journal!)

This is a really useful tool if you want your child to start a task but don't have time to complete it. Simply press the orange 'Draft' button and finish it at a later date. This also means work won't be lost in case of any technology problems! Just don't forget to send it in at some point.

Here are some general hints and tips which we feel would be really useful for you (and us!)

- To respond to tasks, press 'Add response'. Questions, templates and activities can be found. Once your child has done their task, teachers can see this in a number of ways and it's easier to respond to. If the child uploads work to their journal instead of responding directly to the task, it is more challenging to keep a track of. However, children are free to add items to their journal and can often click on the folders icon to select which subject the item is linked to.
- Press the three dots (bottom right hand corner of any task) to edit work. Avoid pressing 'copy and edit' as it
 duplicates work and therefore increases staff workload. It also makes it look like your child hasn't completed the
 work correctly.
- Once a child has completed a piece of work, <u>please</u> **send it immediately** rather than wait until all tasks are completed and send them at the end of the day. This will help teachers give timely feedback and plan for the next day's learning with more accuracy.
- For some reason, recent messages sent by teachers are usually at the bottom of the announcements tab so scroll to the very bottom to keep up-to-date (if your browser/app doesn't do this automatically for you!)

As always, if you have any problems with how to work Seesaw and need a friendly 'walk through' or advice, PLEASE don't hesitate to get in contact with your class teacher or myself – we'd be happy to help.

Thank you for your continued support – here's to celebrating the children's efforts and continuing to grow and improve our remote learning offer.

COVID-19 SYMPTOMS ADVICE

My child has symptoms – what should I do?

Advice on what you should do if your child develops symptoms.

If anyone in your home becomes unwell with a new and persistent cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell, they must stay at home and follow 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection', which sets out that they should self-isolate for at least 10 days and should arrange to have a test to see if they have coronavirus (COVID-19).

If they have tested positive whilst not experiencing symptoms but develop symptoms during the isolation period, they should restart the 10-day isolation period from the day they develop symptoms. Other members of their household (including any siblings) should self-isolate for 10 days from when the symptomatic person first had symptoms.

If your child develops symptoms at home, you must get them tested and continue to keep your school informed. Parents should call the school of their children to inform them of the reason for their child/children's absence.

Your child should not attend any other out of school provision, childcare, activity groups or clubs during this time.





done. I am so proud of their efforts and of the work that they have produced, and have put some photos of what I have been receiving every day below.









Over the past week, the children have continued to work hard on everything we have chucked at them!


We have been reading more Greek myths, with children retelling them using storyboards and they have created their own mythical creatures with high-quality descriptions (more to show next week!)




In maths, we have now moved on from multiplication and division and on to fractions. Mrs Ballard and I have been overwhelmed by level of work and understanding so far!

Keep it up team Gwenver!

















My class are making it incredibly difficult to choose work to go






Mrs Eddy introduced the class to the journey of a river using the music of Smetana. Priya produced beautiful artwork as a response.




In Maths we have continued with Multiplication focusing on our 5x table and developing our problem solving skills through Emoji Challenges and worded problems.



ree FREE SCHOOL MEALS

Are you entitled?

So many families will currently be affected by a sudden loss or drop in income. If your financial circumstances have

changed, have you considered if you might be eligible for free school meals? During this time, families of children who are eligible are currently receiving fortnightly meals provided by Chartwells to the value of the usual lunches.

Free school meals are an entitlement for any family who receives:

- Universal Credit Your household income not exceeding £7,400 per year (after tax and not including any benefits you get) assessed by earnings from uo to three of your most recent assessment periods.
 - Income Support (IS)
- Job Seekers' Allowance (Income-based) and equal based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income Related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA-IR) and equal based Employment and Support Allowance
 - Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 (IAA)
 Support
- Guarantee Element of Pension Credit (GPC)
- Child Tax Credit (CTC) with an annual income of less than £16,190
- -Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
